1972: 40 years ago...

Clark- Stockholders of Fairfield Inc. heard about the company's future and re-elected their officers and directors at the recent annual meeting in Clark. Charles Larkin was re-elected president; Jim Makens, vice president; and Gene Hartman, secretary. Members re-elected to the board of directors were Wayne Bredeson. Don Osheim and John Makens. In his report to the stockholders, Larkin said he was looking forward to improved operations at the potato processing plant because of more efficient production and the company's ability to sell its finished products at higher prices than ever experienced in the past. Larkin said that the firm presently employs 108 people for the three daily shifts. Last year's payroll was about \$500,000, he said. So far this fall, Fairfield has purchased over \$280,000 worth of potatoes from its growers. He said that at present there are still some 700 acres of unharvested potatoes.

1997: 15 years ago...

When a classroom of Watertown secondgrade students wrote a song about birds last week and used the theme music from the Brady Bunch, they were doing more than just having fun. They were learning, in the district's first pullout program for gifted students. It's the first year for the pullout program for gifted first through sixth-grade students in the Watertown School District. The Gifted And Talented Enrichment program (GATE) offers students and instructors the advantage of time to focus on exercises and develop curriculum for the course which consists of 22. three-hour class sessions at Jefferson Elementary. The students meet weekly and the projects are different for each age group. The purpose of the gifted program, according to Lesli Hanson, Assistant Superintendent, is to identify gifted students at a young age and keep them in school. "Many get frustrated sitting in a classroom when things don't move along," she said.
